Welcome to the fourth issue of the ASC Best Practice Guide, a new and free monthly resource for individuals with an autistic spectrum condition, professionals, and parents.

Which organisation does this Guide come from?

The Guide is written under the banner of the St. Nicholas Academy for Autism Trust, a non-denominational North-London based ASC and special needs charity. About the charity, one of its Trustees writes:

"Imagine a school for ASC children, that not only provides the best, bespoke environment to learn and play in, but also by its very existence assists in raising international awareness of ASC. This is the vision of The St Nicholas Academy. It is an integral part of our philosophy and vision that the building serves the needs of family, friends and all those who are affected and need information, counselling and encouragement.

The Saint Nicholas Academy for Autism Trust ("Nickys") is the Holding Trust that will own the land on which the school buildings/facilities will be built, as well as the buildings and facilities and all other assets. We are now securing land gifted to the Academy in North London and hope to be able to commence work constructing Nickys in the near future."

Who writes and edits the Guide?

The Guide is written by Christine Haugh, and edited by Chris Mitchell.

Christine Haugh's two sons are diagnosed with autistic spectrum conditions. She works at Middlesex University for a DfES-funded organisation called Aimhigher, where her duties include Project Management of Aimhigher London North's activities for learners with special educational needs, including autistic spectrum conditions.

Chris Mitchell was diagnosed with Asperger Syndrome at University, at the age of twenty. For the first twenty years of his life, Chris felt that he was someone who didn't exist, trying to fit into a social environment he couldn't understand. However, once diagnosed, he found a reason for who he was and his self-confidence returned. Since his diagnosis, Chris has completed his MA (Hons) in Information and Library Management at the University of Northumbria. He has also become an advocate for Asperger Syndrome. Most recently, he has published the autobiography Glass Half-Empty, Glass Half-Full. Currently, he works as a clerical assistant with Durham County Council's Special Educational Needs Department. He also speaks about his experiences of Asperger Syndrome at various events and conferences throughout the UK, including the 2005 Aimhigher "Transition to University" Summerschool for students with autistic spectrum conditions, where Chris and Christine met, and at an annual lecture at the University of Northumbria. Additionally, Chris coordinates training workshops for professionals who work with ASC.

To ensure accuracy and relevance, prior to its publication, the Guide was read and feedback was contributed by a range of individuals including relevant education and health professionals from a number of different Boroughs, individuals with autistic spectrum conditions, and parents. The purpose of this Guide is to provide practical support in the form of a one-stop-shop of information on existing good practice in the field of Autistic Spectrum Conditions, in relation especially to Transitions. "Transitions" is a broad term, encompassing phase transfer to nursery, primary, or secondary schools, as well as to further and higher education and even adult learning opportunities. "Transitions" also covers the area of transition between types of placement, for instance from specialist to mainstream, or from home education to school-based provision. Information provided in this guide will come from a range of reputable, identifiable sources, such as the DfES. Whenever possible, links to relevant websites will be included alongside the information provided. Always, the intention is to empower the audience by keeping them informed of existing good practice.

CHILDREN'S AND YOUTH SERVICES

AUTISMBUCKS (HIGH WYCOMBE AND AYLESBURY, BUCKS)

Autismbucks is a registered charity (charity no.1110374), set up to help both parents and professionals gain a better understanding of ASC. It also offers practical assistance to families affected by ASC.

Autismbucks began by specializing in the Spectrum Youth Clubs for adolescents with Asperger Syndrome or High-Functioning Autism. The High Wycombe Club has been running extremely successfully since May 2002, and the Aylesbury Club has been doing likewise since October 2004. The Clubs provide a safe and comfortable environment for these youngsters who are often isolated elsewhere due to their difficulties.

The Clubs address difficulties through common interest and assisted activities. Consequently, there are a far greater number of activities on offer than at most other Youth Clubs. For instance, if a person is interested in trains, then Autismbucks would engage in activities and conversation, usually with two young people, using the electric model railway layout, which is mounted at waist height in a "village" setting. If a person is new and very withdrawn the Club may start by asking the person what they think would be a good item to add to the train setting, where it should be placed, etc., and then the item would be purchased and made available for the next Club session. This would help ensure the person felt valued as a member of the Club. With multi-player games such as Playstation, they are assisted not only to share but also to help others less proficient, thereby raising self-esteem. Good actions are always praised or rewarded, and any problems addressed or explained immediately. Consequently, there is always a great atmosphere as everyone knows they

are safe and also understood; everyone is relaxing and understanding of others.

Both Clubs have a "quiet corner" where difficulties can be discussed. Generally, the Clubs are very busy with around 25 young people attending any one session. This level of activity also makes the Clubs feel like any other Youth Club- this appeals to our members.

The Spectrum Clubs can also act as a "neutral" zone between home and school, where concerns can be addressed in a fully supportive and knowledgeable environment. Holiday activities are also organized where members visit places such as adventure parks, and the entire family can enjoy a day out without conflict or worry.

Autismbucks are heavily reliant on the goodwill and continued commitment of their volunteers, and also donations from various organizations and from parents. Parents are also able to share their own experiences with others at the Clubs, which can make them feel less alone and help them meet others who share the same kind of problems that surround social, behavioural and educational issues.

Autismbucks hope to raise enough funds to pay for services that can be difficult for parents to access, such as respite care and Occupational Therapy, music and drama sessions at the Spectrum Clubs, and also for holiday activities.

-THE BRIDGE- (RICHMOND, SW LONDON)

-the bridge- aims to work in partnership with professionals across all disciplines to find innovative solutions to overcome shortages in service provision and to identify best practice that can be adopted in Richmond. In doing this, -the bridge- hopes to create better opportunities in education, training, and remedial support for the children.

A parent-led charity, -the bridge- works the benefit of children and families where there is a social communication disorder such as ASC or ADHD. The majority of the children helped by -the bridge- are in mainstream schools and yet their social communication difficulties can pose serious problems relating to their behaviour, social communication skills, and ability to be educated. -the bridge- aims to offer opportunities for its members' children to develop the skills they need to integrate more fully into society.

-the bridge- currently offer the following:

- Talking Group-for children aged 4+, these are weekly social skills workshops run by two experienced group leaders. The Workshops also enjoy regular input from a Speech and Language Therapist. Parents also meet regularly while their children are at Talking Group
- Talking Group Drama- a natural progression from Talking Group, Drama is run by an
 experienced educational drama teacher, plus an assistant. In Drama, children aged 6-13
 use basic drama structures such as role-play, movement and tableaux to develop and
 extend the skills acquired in Talking Group
- **Sport-** run by specialist coaches with direction from an experienced Occupational Therapist and Speech and Language Therapist, the Sport programme enables children to develop motor skills and join in team games in a safe and supportive environment
- Activate- a new Social Skills Group that uses Sensory Integration techniques alongside Speech Therapy. The active play promotes social skills, language development, and enables the children to be more at ease in their environment
- **Inform-** Discussion Evenings and Speaker Events for parents and professionals, where experts in various fields provide information, advice and guidance.
- Liaise- currently -the bridge- is working with the Project for Children with Special Needs in Richmond and Richmond NAS as well as specialists in the health, education, and social service departments of the LEA.

COUNTY DURHAM AUTISTIC SUPPORT GROUP (DURHAM, NE ENGLAND)

CDASG, the County Durham Autistic Support Group (registered charity no.1071758), has been established for a decade and has 270 members at present. 71% of the members are families, and the remaining 29% are either professionals or individuals who themselves have a diagnosis of autism or Asperger Syndrome.

CDASG run a telephone helpline, publish a monthly newsletter for members, and run activities for families with autistic spectrum conditions. Activities include trips, pool parties, soft play evenings and rock climbing. These activities as well as the three support group meetings each month give parents, children with ASC and their siblings an opportunity to meet up, talk, and enjoy activities they would find problematic if attempted in isolation

CDASG also run three conferences a year and even provide training for anyone wanting to know more about autistic spectrum conditions. CDASG aim to provide help, support and advice to all interested parties and the group has been proactive in policy development within Durham, the NE of England, as well as nationally.

Disability Challengers is a Guildford-based charity (charity no.1095134) which provides play and leisure for disabled children and young people, their friends and family. They do this all year round at their play centre in Guildford and at schemes across Surrey and Bracknell.

Disability Challengers have spent 25 years working across Surrey, and are dedicated to cost effective and imaginative partnership working- for instance, in the past year alone. the charity has worked in partnership with Surrey County Council, Guidford Borough Council, and Bracknell Forest Borough Council, in order to bid for sites for be used to create new play schemes and develop community-based projects.

Different schemes run on Saturdays, Sundays, after school and during holidays, in Bagshot, Dorking, Farnham, Guildford, Leatherhead, and Oxted. Play Schemes are for children aged 4-12. Challengers Youth Schemes are for young people aged 13-18. All of both the Play and the Youth Schemes have places for persons who need one-to-one support and who have complex impairments.

PARENTS OF AUTISTIC CHILDREN TOGETHER (LONDON BOROUGHS OF BARKING AND DAGENHAM, HAVERING AND REDBRIDGE)

PACT, Parents of Autistic Children Together, was established in October 1995 and was subsequently registered as a charity (charity no.1067928) in February 1998. To date, PACT has a membership of approximately 150 families, all who have at least one child with ASC. PACT is the **only** ASC-specialized voluntary sector provider working in this area of outer London, its services covering the London Boroughs of Barking and Dagenham, Havering and Redbridge. Currently, services and activities provided by PACT can be divided into those for children/young people and those for parents/carers. Children and youth people (ASC children and siblings) are offered a fully-integrated activity programme including Youth Clubs, drama, football, soft play and also swimming sessions, as well as outings and residential outdoor pursuits, all of which focus on improving self-esteem and self-confidence. Parents/carers can access a number of services ranging from general support and information about ASC to advocacy, information and advice offered on issues such as education, health and benefits. PACT collates and distributes a quarterly newsletter to its members and also to over 70 health and education professionals. PACT is also working in partnership with its Local Education Authority, developing a project to help young children with speech and communication disorders.

Last year, over 20 children and young people with autistic spectrum conditions attended the summer play scheme, which ran during three weeks of the summer holiday. Activities included swimming, park visits, and a trip to Legoland.

Places on the holiday play scheme are offered on a first-come-first-served basis, and always book up very quickly, so it would help Resources for Autism if interested individuals could make contact as soon as possible.

SIGNAL (LEWISHAM, SE LONDON)

Signal is a long established group for parents of children and young people on the autistic spectrum.

It is a voluntary charity based in Lewisham, SE London, and run by parents. The group holds monthly evening meetings with guest speakers; the speakers this year have included Professor Patricia Howlin and Dr. Gillian Baird. Signal also runs coffee mornings, produces a bi-monthly newsletter and has an extensive library from which parents can borrow books, videos, and DVDs. Signal arrange family outings, a Book Club, a Siblings Group, weekly Trampolining sessions for ASC children and their siblings, and are in the process of setting up a 16+ group. For a number of years, Signal also has run a very successful Social Skills/Dramatherapy Group, for children aged 7 up to 14/15. In this group, through the use of structured activities, experienced facilitators work with small groups of children to develop and extend the children's self-awareness, awareness of others and group participation. Acceptance on the course is subject to assessment by the facilitators. Finally, Signal operates on a strategic basis: they work in partnership with other local organisations and representatives from Education, Health, and Social Services, in order to affect a positive change in provision for all persons in Lewisham with an ASC and their families. "SNAAP" CLUB- FINCHLEY CATHOLIC HIGH SCHOOL/ST. NICHOLAS ACADEMY FOR AUTISM TRUST (BARNET, N. LONDON)

"SNAAP" is an after-school club for families affected by an autistic spectrum condition. Funded by Barnet Council, the Club offers members the opportunity to socialise, develop computer and now also art skills, in a friendly environment where the entire family is welcome.

Every Wednesday term-time from 3:30pm-6pm, "SNAAP" meets at Finchley Catholic High School, Woodside Lane, Finchley, N12. There is parking available in the school car park. The Club is free of charge and run by Finchley Catholic High School with the **St. Nicholas Academy for Autism Trust**, and is open to **ANYONE** in Barnet with an autistic spectrum condition, all abilities and ages welcome.

Parents/siblings/carers and friends are also welcome, and snacks are provided (but anyone with special dietary requirements is invited to bring their own refreshments). The Club has a number of trained, established helpers for its members- students and staff from Finchley Catholic High School and St. Michaels RC Grammar School. Members can receive guidance on how to use the computer and the internet; they can also play games, do homework, create Personal Passports and more. Art Workshops are offered at the Club, at no cost, in an adjacent studio!

TRAINING PROVIDERS FOR TEACHERS, LEARNING SUPPORT ASSISTANTS, PARENT/CARERS

WWW.ONLINEINSET.NET (BASED IN HOVE- BUT AVAILABLE NATIONWIDE)

In 1999, the Government commissioned 11 Regional SEN Partnerships to identify regional priorities and develop and extend inclusive practice. The South Central Regional Partnership, (SCRIP) identified that many of the Local Education Authorities in its region provide a considerable amount of training for staff who work with pupils who have special educational needs. However, it was also identified that staff who work directly with pupils, such as class teachers and learning support assistants, have practical difficulties in leaving the classroom to access training courses. Therefore, SCRIP developed an online training package for these staff. For the past five years, SCRIP has commissioned experts in their fields to write short training courses. These courses include the following: "Understanding ASD"; "Understanding Speech, Language and Communication Needs"; and "Understanding and Managing Behaviour". Each course is led by a course tutor, whom OnlineInset can arrange tutor training for. Existing OnlineInset tutors include

SEN Advisors, SENCos, Speech and Language Therapists, Educational Psychologists, and Specialist Teachers. Courses run every term.

Each student is given a course password and can access the materials through school and home online computer. The costs of professional development are significantly decreased by online learning, whereas the numbers of potential participants significantly widens.

The course on "Understanding ASD" is suitable for those persons working with children in mainstream classrooms across all Key Stages. *Parents comprised a small number of the students who have previously accessed this course.*

The course has four main sections:

- Understanding Autistic Spectrum
- Assessment for Learning
- Interventions
- Case Studies

The course has interactive elements and built-in evaluation tools. On-line tutors can monitor progress and set up on-line forums and discussion groups. Students who complete the course receive a Certificate of Online Completion.

All Local Education Authorities within the SCRIP region have unlimited free access to the courses; Local Education Authorities based outside of the region are able to make an annual subscription which allows them to use all OnlineInset's training courses in any setting. This subscription includes training places for five tutors. The Local Education Authorities, in turn, can charge schools to access this training. Each participating authority will be allowed to participate in the commissioning of new modules.

These local authorities have subscribed to the project so far: Oxfordshire, Milton Keynes, Hampshire, Buckinghamshire, Wokingham, Windsor and Maidenhead, Slough, Reading, West Berkshire, Bracknell Forest, Portsmouth, Southampton, Isle of Wight, Surrey, East Sussex, Brighton and Hove, Kent and Spring Hallow School in Ealing. Other authorities are considering subscribing to this project in the next academic year. School licenses are also available where a local authority has not yet subscribed.

SPECIALIST SCHOOLS, FOR PUPILS AGED 4-16

CHRYSALIS SCHOOL FOR AUTISM (HERTFORDSHIRE)

Officially opened on Monday 5th December 2005, Chrysalis (registered charity number 1101424) is a special independent school for persons with autistic spectrum conditions aged 4-11. Chrysalis is a school dedicated to Applied Behavioural Analysis, ABA, and was founded by 2 Hertfordshire parents who themselves had previously been running home-based ABA programmes. It is the first ABA school to open in Hertfordshire.

Chrysalis has a Head Teacher, a team of Tutors, a Board of Trustees and an advisory body. Five pupils are currently enrolled at Chrysalis and the school welcomes applications both from further pupils as well as from ABA tutors. Volunteer support is also kindly appreciated. SPRINGHALLOW SCHOOL (EALING, W. LONDON)

Springhallow School is an Ealing LEA maintained day community special school. Its students are between the ages of 4-16/17, and have ASC and learning difficulties. The School has a Family Worker, an Occupational Therapist and a Speech Therapist working on site.

Springhallow's staff are trained in Applied Behavioural Analysis, ABA, and work with cluster of local

schools to identify how this approach may be effectively transferred to other settings. Springhallow has access to a number of mainstream schools within the London Borough of Ealing, in order to run integration/inclusion programmes for Springhallow's pupils. Further, pupils from these mainstream schools are able to come in to Springhallow to access the special school's expertise and relevant programmes.

Ealing LEA deals with the admissions process for the school, so any admissions queries need to be made directly to the LEA's Special Educational Needs Department, the telephone number for which is (0208)825-5533.

Springhallow School is currently applying for Specialist School Academy status, which is a bit like the Specialist College status many secondary schools have. If Springhallow is successful in its application, it will mean that the government will fund the school to extend its Outreach programme. This will provide local schools, parents and professionals alike with opportunities for ASC training at Springhallow. It will also enable Springhallow to enhance its provision so that more students would be able to access its resources, be given support by its staff and be supported within the school on a part-time basis.

FARLEIGH FURTHER EDUCATION COLLEGE (FROME, SOMERSET)

Farleigh Further Education College, FFEC, is an independent further education college specialist in Asperger Syndrome. Established in 2000, FFEC is registered with the Learning and Skills Council and is a full NATSPEC member. It is a member of the Priory Group.

Students have a diagnosis of Asperger Syndrome and are between 16-20 years of age. Most will have had Statements of Special Educational Need, and all have ambitions to live in mainstream communities as independent adults. With the help of support staff, students develop and extend self-help skills in one of four different residences In addition to the support staff, FFEC has its own Speech and Language Therapist, Occupational Therapist, Art Therapist and a Counsellor. They are involved in the assessment of students and the development of individual programmes, which can include both one-to-one and small group therapy input.

Most of the FFEC students attend local mainstream Wiltshire College, supported by the FFEC. Students can elect to study A-levels at Wiltshire College. Students maintain close contact with Connexions advisors and those who wish to attend a University are provided with a range of practical information, advice and guidance, including careful transition planning.

For those interested in attending FFEC, the College Admission Procedure sets out that initial contact is expected to be made via the student/family or a Connexions Advisor. The FFEC sends the student a Prospectus and the student's paperwork must be sent to and arrive at the FFEC no later than 15th October on the year prior to intended entry. Students who the FFEC considers it might be able to meet their needs the FFEC will invite to an Admissions Day. These Days are held in the Autumn Term of the year prior to entry. There are usually 6 Admission Days/academic year, with 6-8 students and parents attending on each Day. By the end of Autumn Term, all Admission Day students will have been informed as to whether they have been offered a place, have been refused a place, or are on the waiting list. FFEC is generally oversubscribed so a waiting list exists, where students are prioritized in terms of need. Once students have been offered a place, they attend an Enrolment Day, after which the FFEC's Head of Education applies for funding. Once funding is agreed, the placement at FFEC is confirmed. Students will be invited to a New Students Day in the summer holiday prior to September entry, in order to decrease anxiety.

LEARNING, EMPLOYMENT AND SOCIAL SUPPORT FOR ADULTS

BROMLEY AUTISTIC TRUST, ADULT SERVICES (KENT)

Bromley Autistic Trust's Adult Services comprise a small Day Service (16 places), 3 Registered Residential Care Homes, 5 Supported Living Flats, and an Independent Lifestyles (Domiciliary Support) Service, all of which cater specifically for the needs of adults with ASC. This side of the service is likely to expand in the near future. There is a support group for the parents of adults with ASC, which provides information and advice as well as social contact. There is also a Youth Club and a Luncheon Club for adults who themselves have an ASC. This branch of the Trust also provides training and consultancy on ASC and associated issues for parents and family carers, care staff and other relevant professionals.

Courses include:

- An introduction to Autism and Asperger Syndrome
- Practical Approaches to working with ASC
- Asperger Syndrome and the Autistic Spectrum

- Sex and Sexuality for people with an ASC
- · Autism and Challenging Behaviour
- Loss and Bereavement
- Autism and Sensory Perception

Courses can be tailor-made to meet individual or organizational need. Half days, full days, or more intensive courses with follow-up workshops are available. The Trust can also provide a consultancy service.

THE CINEMA EXHIBITORS' ASSOCIATION CARD (NATIONWIDE)

The Cinema Exhibitors' Association Card is a national card that can be used to verify that the holder is entitled for one free ticket, for a person (such as a parent/carer/sibling/friend) accompanying them to the cinema. The card is valid for three years from the date of issue and there is no limit to the amount of times it can be used.

Persons with autism and Asperger Syndrome are eligible to receive a card, *if* they receive either the Disability Living Allowance (any rate), Attendance Allowance, or hold a Disabled Person's Rail Card.

Application forms are available from cinemas across the UK supporting this Card. Applications can also be downloaded from the Cinema Exhibitors' Association website. Along with the form, a one-off £5 processing payment, passport sized photograph, and copies of Disability Living Allowance (or other applicable) Award proving entitlement to the Card must be posted. It takes a few weeks for the application form to be processed and the person eligible to receive their Card, but if persons apply now they should receive their Card prior to the summer holidays.
